STREET CRACK: AN ADDICTING PISTOL SUPPRESSOR

The bills get paid with rifle and machine gun suppressor systems. However, pistol suppressors do one thing very well for civilian users. They are fun. Very fun. Short of installing an ejector seat in your Aston, there's nothing else that makes you feel more like 007 than screwing a silencer to the end of your handgun. Sitting at your dining room table after the kids have gone to bed, letting the suds of the White Claw you poured into a martini glass tickle your mustache, staring at your suppressed Glock 19 while your wife pointedly ignores you. You're a tuxedo (and a Walther) away from being James Bond. You know it and we know it. Espionage, intrigue and women with inuendo for names is what you were born for. So, how do we go about making one of these insanely

been known for here at CAT? Simple, we gather up all our eggheads and apply all of our design philosophies to a pistol suppressor. We ignore your preconceptions of a dapper and debonairly bedecked British secret agent, and we make the Street Crack. A truly addicting 9mm pistol suppressor. Street Crack was developed to meet the market demands with a full suite of features. We start with DiVerge, the SkyNET tech found in MOB. We then tune this for

application with 9mm semi-automatic pistols. Street Crack is a modular 9mm pistol suppressor, with a

removable front section that lets the end user find the appropriate size for their ammunition use case. We designed it to work with both 10 and 12 tooth pistons. We fine-tuned SC further with a dedicated custom made piston spring and used our established additive manufacturing techniques on both the main suppressor and the extension. Street Crack is one of the projects we did because it's cool. It's addictive, habit forming even. Put that in your pipe and smoke it.... Just try to not steal any catalytic converters in the process.

However, they must also balance these attributes with effective muzzle recoil and signature mitigation over longer distances but remain short and lighter in weight, as they are added to a weapon system carried over distance. New Dirty Dave or "DD", spoken about in the previous newsletter, is the first from Kitty CAT in the new Recce arena of multi-purpose, same caliber, hybrid suppressors. DD is designed to be short (at 6"), be optimized for semi-auto platforms between 13" to 18" but be effective on +20" semi-auto sniper systems too. DD is similar to WB and ODB in its ability to do multiple things really, really well but DD is more than just focused on doing the 'Big Five' (Sound, Flash, Flow, Blast and Durability), its required to

ODB. It is capable of suppressing 7.62 NATO, but we optimized and built it for the 7.62x39mm cartridge used by the AK47. When specifically choosing to make a 7.62 NATO suppressor for Recce platforms, we decided to make Dirty Dave, which for its size does amazing things on a big, rough platform like AR10 shooting M80. Unfortunately, our approach doesn't always sit well with the industry (or even a lot of civilian users), who are often content to make or buy a product that tries to do all things for all people. We understand that suppressors are novel to many new users and that the process to own one as a civilian takes a minute to wrap your brain around. This causes many suppressor manufacturers to come up with a multi-cal suppressor that is a jack of all trades... but master of none. Manufacturers are aware that buying dedicated suppressors is money and time, that sometimes one model to do multiple platforms is a much easier sell. And we totally understand why a new consumer would want a multi-cal suppressor for the reasons above but why aren't they told it's a generic and its this detail we have a point of issue with –

putting a sale over the education of performance. We believe that generics should be capped at \$500, should be made in a robust, subtractive material and be in their own category, so new civilian users aren't spending over \$800 on effectively a suppression tube, which they are today. The market (you) is more educated than ever before. Wait times (thanks, alphabet bois) are as short as they have ever been. Why waste time designing, building, selling, buying, waiting on forms for a suppressor that won't work as well as the user wants it to? You're smarter than that. We know you want to optimize the caliber you shoot most. We like to think of this like optics. You can certainly buy one piece of glass for all of your rifles. Maybe it's a 1-10 LPVO like the instagrammers tell you that you need. It will work on your AR, your 10/22, your .308 bolt gun just fine. But if you never shoot your AR over 25yds then you should have gotten a lighter/smaller red dot. If you shoot your .308 at steel targets sitting out at 800yds or significantly more... it would be way easier to do with some more magnification. Does it work? Yes. Are you smarter than that? Also, yes. If you own more than one optic, you recognize that there are different optics

for different philosophies of use. Kicking in doors with an MP-5 is different than pooping in your ghillie suit. We happen to make suppressors that are optimized for both activities. In light of all of this, and to curtail any confusion, we have revamped the website. For those of you who have not seen, we provided the optimized caliber for the suppressors and the velocity ranges of those calibers. You'll also notice some additions to the Dirty Dave owner's manual that you'll start to see more of in the future. We want you, the end user, to have the most information possible about the product.
